Prayers for the Church

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: Following the Anglican Cycle of Prayer, please pray for Bishop Prince Singh and the clergy and people of the Diocese of Rochester, one of the 109 dioceses in The Episcopal Church; and for Bishop James Langstaff and the clergy and people of the Diocese of Rochester, one of the 42 dioceses in The Church of England.

The Diocese of Rochester (USA) was formed in 1931 by the division of the Diocese of Western New York. Some of the churches inherited by the then new diocese had been in existence for more than 100 years. It now includes 46 parishes in large cities, small country towns, and rural areas. Earlier this year, the diocese announced that church attendance had grown (by 1.3 percent) for the first time in two decades.

The Diocese of Rochester (England) was founded in 604, the same year that the Diocese of London was formed. As far as dioceses are concerned, only the Diocese of Canterbury is older in the Church of England (some individual churches are hundreds of years older). The diocese is so close to London that the diocesan boundaries include two of the boroughs of London. The diocese now has 268 churches in both rural and urban areas and more than 500 licensed lay leaders.

Education is cited by the diocese as being at the core of its mission and 26,200 children are taught in church-run schools, with more schools under construction. The diocese also promotes/runs many social service and community projects, including a large ministry for those suffering from dementia. There are at least two convents of Anglican nuns in the diocese.

For both dioceses, please pray especially for evangelism, outreach to youth, and vocations.
